Yours of the 8th instant came duly to hand in which you still mention the most sincere marks of esteem. I make no doubt, allow me to be candid, but the conjugal state is the most happy in the world if the love between the parties be mutual and their study be to contribute to each other's welfare and happiness, and I certainly would not address you on this topic if I was not convinced in my own mind that this would be the case; allow me my dear Sir once more to say that it is a serious thing to trifle with a female's affections and character but I feel confidence from our family acquaintance and the opinion I have formed of yourself that I shall not see an instance of this kind in the present affair.
