

Referring to your enquiry we beg to inform you that we
just received two reports which we much regret to say are
as follows. The Cross 14967, in No 23 General Hospital
files on the 18th October states:
"I was with the Captain all day. We were both wounded in the
morning early. I got a broken leg and he was badly wounded
by a bomb explosion. We managed to crawl about 20 yards
away from the trench. In the afternoon he insisted on my
going away, and I was several hours crawling to our trench.
I covered him with some coats and made him as comfortable
as I could. When I got to our trench we were relieved by the
D.I.I. I asked some soldiers to fetch him but they were not able
to leave. Then an officer, I do not know who it was, and a man
went out to fetch him in. They came back and told me he was dead

L/Cpl H Adams, 7911 in 5th Batt K.S.I.I in V.A.D. Hospital
Rusthall Tunbridge Wells on the 20th October whose Home add
is 46 Wingfield Gardens Ditterington Shrewsbury states: —
"I last saw Capt Clarke on Saty Sept 25th at Hodge on the left
of the Lake about 10 in the morning. It was after the charge
in the counter attack, and I was close to Capt Clarke in the
barbed wire. A bomb exploded severely injuring Capt Clarke

was able to go on for a little. Then I was wounded and I crawled back down the communication trench I came across Capt. Clarke but I think they could never get him away as the Germans were coming on in hundreds and he was so severely wounded.

In the boat coming to England I saw Capt. Firth of the regiment and enquired about Capt. Clarke. Capt. Firth said that he thought Capt. Clarke had been brought out but was severely wounded. I said I was doubtful if Capt. Clarke had been made a prisoner as we were fighting against the Russian Guard.

Although it is frequently found that the observation of privates in the stress and confusion of battle is not to be relied on yet it is to be noted that in this case there are two privates and that both speak as definite eye-witnesses, it is however to be also noted that the statement that Capt. Clarke is dead is hearsay and should not be accepted without confirmation.

On the 6th inst I received a letter from you telling me that my son was killed in action on Sept 28th 1915 for which I thank you. I should be much obliged however if you would let me know why you describe him as Lieutenant R. S. Clarke. On Sept 22nd we had a letter from him in which he said, "You will be glad to hear that I have been promoted Captain now." On Oct 5th I had a letter from his C.O. in which he is called captain, the Colonel says Captain R. S. Clarke led his company in the charge. On November 6th I had a letter from the War Office in which he is again called Captain R. S. Clarke, but in your letter of the 5th inst he is now called Lieutenant R. S. Clarke. I do not understand the reason for this.

I buried eight men close by where he is lying and a cross was over his grave, but I know the grave was blown up again in the night of the charge on the 25th September at Hooge, so whether they buried him after that or what they did I do not know, but I actually saw his grave myself at H. 15, at Hooge.

Informant said he last saw Capt. Clarke on Sat. Sept. 25th. at Hooge on the left of the Lake about 10 in the morning. It was after the charge, in the counter attack, and informant was close to Capt. Clarke in the barbed wire. A bomb exploded, severely injuring Capt. Clarke, but informant was able to go on for a little. Then informant was wounded and as he crawled back down the communication trench he came across Capt. Clarke who spoke to him; four men were trying to move Capt. Clarke but informant thinks they could never get him away as the Germans were coming on in hundreds and he was so severely wounded. Informant was afraid that both thighs were shattered. In the boat coming to England informant saw Capt. Firth of his regiment and enquired about Capt. Clarke. Capt. Firth said that he thought Capt. Clarke had been brought out, but was severely wounded. Informant said he was doubtful if Capt. Clarke had been made

a prisoner as they were fighting against the Prussian Guard. He spoke most highly of Capt. Clarke and said he was a splendid man.

"I was with him all day. We were both wounded in the morning early. I got a broken leg and a bomb explosion shattered his lower quarters and two or three fingers. We managed to crawl about 20 yards away from the trench. In the afternoon he insisted on my going away, and I was several hours crawling to our trench. I covered him with some coats and made him as comfortable as I could. When I got to our trench we were relieved by the D.L.I. I asked some soldiers to fetch him but they were not able to leave. Then an officer, I do not know who it was, and a man, went out to fetch him in. They came back and told me he was dead, and nearly covered with water as it had been raining."
