One operational flight was carried out to-day. This was a flight of 8 aircraft led 29.4.45 by B/L.D.LHEE, detailed to attack a H.Q. at S. 728514 (10 miles East of HAMBURG). The target was found, despite bad weather, and attacked with good effect. A large explosion occurred, followed by flames to 300 feet. Flak was experienced from the target area. It is worthy of note that enemy aircraft were reported throughout the time the formation was in the area, but none were encountered or seen. Another new pilot from G.S.U. was welcomed to the Squadron today - F/S.W.G.WOOD. Most of the day was spent waiting and hoping for something to turn up.
